**Notes:**

- The 183 filled CSHO positions above includes 4 CSHOs who are Acting District Managers (ADM) in Fremont, Oakland, Redding and San Francisco, who now conduct no or very few field inspections themselves.
- The 183 filled CSHO positions also include 1 CSHO who works part-time, and 12 CSHOs who are in training (SET, TAU, T&D, Junior SE) and do not conduct independent inspections alone.
- The California Employment Development Department (EDD) reported the Californian civilian labor force in April 2015 as 18,953,700 workers.
- The 183 currently filled CSHO positions represents an inspector to worker ratio of 1 inspector to 103,572 workers. If the four CSHOs working as ADMs are subtracted from the number of CSHOs, the inspector to worker ratio would be 1 to 105,887.
- The 183 filled CSHO positions in May 2015 are below the 195 filled positions left by Republican Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger in January 2011.

- The 183 filled CSHO positions are also below the number of California Fish & Game Wardens (250+) currently working in the field.
- Cal/OSHA's inspector to worker ratio of 1 inspector to 100,000 workers is worse (less health protective) than Fed OSHA's ratio of 1 to 59,000; Washington State's ratio of 1 to 25,000; and Oregon's ratio of 1 to 22,000. [These non-California ratios were cited in the Department of Industrial Relations' Budget Change Proposal of January 2015.]
