Notes:

- Of the 227 filled CSHO positions, there are 15 Senior Safety Engineer (SSE) positions in District Offices. The SSEs are to spend 50% of their time on District Office administrative matters and 50% of their time conducting compliance inspections. Therefore, the number of CSHOs available for field inspections is 219.5 CSHOs.
- The 25 vacant CSHO positions include 3 new positions in the PSM unit which were fully funded starting in July 2017. One Senior Safety Engineer (SSE) position is vacant in the Van Nuys District Office. Because SSE positions can only be filled by internal

- promotion, current Safety Engineers/compliance officers will be promoted and the resulting 1 CSHO vacancy will need to be backfilled.
- DOSH has a vacancy rate for CSHO positions of 9.9% (25 vacancies in 252 positions). The January 2018 Organization Charts show 252 CSHO positions compared to 254 CSHO positions in August 2017. No explanation has been given for the two missing CSHO positions.
 - Each unfilled CSHO position represents \$150,000 annually in salary, benefits and operating costs that are fully under previous and the current state budgets. Between July 2015 and June 2017, there were an average of 34 vacancies a month, meaning the unused Cal/OSHA enforcement resources amounted to \$10,200,000 for the 24-month period. The CSHO vacancies in the first six months of the current state fiscal year (July – December 2017) represent an additional \$2,587,500 in unused resources. Since July 2015, more than \$12.7 million in available state resources for enforcement have been left unused.
 - The California Employment Development Department (EDD) reported the Californian civilian labor force in November 2017 as 19,393,400 workers. The 219.5 field-available filled CSHO positions represents an inspector to worker ratio of 1 inspector to 88,352 workers. Cal/OSHA's inspector to worker ratio of 1 inspector to 88,000 workers is less health protective than Washington State's ratio of 1 to 25,000, and Oregon's ratio of 1 to 22,000. [These non-California ratios were cited in the Department of Industrial Relations' Budget Change Proposal of January 2015.]
 - In 1980, Federal OSHA had a ratio of 14.8 CSHOs per million workers. Thirty-eight years later, Cal/OSHA has a ratio of 11.4 CSHOs per million workers.
 - The 219.5 field-available CSHO positions are also below the number of California Fish & Game Wardens (250) currently working in the field.
 - The 219.5 field-available CSHO positions also include 33 CSHOs who are in training (SET, TAU, T&D, Junior SE) and usually do not conduct independent inspections alone.
 - There are 10 District Offices without a District Manager: Fremont, High Hazard-North, High Hazard-South, LEFT-South, Monrovia, Oakland, PSM/Non-refinery-North, PSM/Refinery-North, PSM/Refinery-South, and San Francisco. In these District Offices, a CSHO must serve as Acting District Manager, so those offices effectively have one additional CSHO vacancy as the ADMs do not conduct field inspections.

Additional Note:

As of December 2017, there are only 37 field CSHOs who receive bilingual pay, after passing a proficiency exam in speaking languages other than English, as listed below. It is estimated that 5 million of the state's 19+ million worker labor force speak languages other than English, with many monolingual in their native tongue.
